

This year's pilgrimage to the grave of St John Kemble takes place today. The walkers from Monmouth meet other pilgrims at 3.00 pm at St. John Kemble's Grave in the Churchyard at Welsh Newton for the Rosary, Readings and Prayer.

During the month of August the Parish Outreach 2nd collection will be devoted to both local and international charities. These will include St Joseph's School, Makeni. St Joseph's is a very special school, started in Makeni, Sierra Leone in 1979, destroyed in the civil war of the 90s, & lovingly re-established in 2003. Care & education is provided for over 250 hearing impaired students aged 3 to 18 from very poor backgrounds, who are often marginalized or rejected.

Homily

"There are those now last who will be first, and those now first who will be last."

In his novel *The Magic Mountain*, the German author Thomas Mann describes how the visit of a young man to his cousin in a Swiss sanatorium ends up in a seven-year stay as his own health deteriorates. Once in the sanatorium the young man's perception of space and time alters, and it is only with the advent of the First World War that he is jolted

into leaving. Mann's novel speaks to each of us, for we all seek to find refuge from the reality of life, and once in the security of our refuge it takes a momentous event to jolt us out. In scripture we are given the story of how human beings, through the sickness of sin, are driven from their home. The prophets are sent to help the people overcome this sickness, but the people prefer to remain in the false refuge of their sins. It will take a momentous event. the momentous event of human history, to jolt us out of our sin: the narrow door that is the cross of Jesus Christ.

Gospel Teaching

At the time of Jesus there is evidence of various Jewish groups who claimed to be the true remnant of Israel, the few from among all those who called themselves Jewish who would be saved. Is this what Jesus came to establish: a small group of the chosen; the few from among the mass of humanity who are to be saved?

At first sight this is what Jesus seems to be saying: "many will try to enter and will not succeed". Later, however, he refers to the prophetic vision of Isaiah that people from "east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the kingdom of God". Any attempt to

identify a small core or remnant in contrast to the mass of humanity runs against what Jesus is teaching. So how are we to understand the saying about the narrow door?

A door can seem narrow to us for two reasons. Firstly, if the door really is narrow relative to our size. Secondly, if, although the door is wider than our body, we are unsteady on our feet and so cannot get through it. It is in this second sense that Jesus talks of the narrow door of salvation. It is due to the sickness of sin that the door to salvation is narrow, for we prefer to remain in our sins rather than accept the help of the one who can heal us and bring us through that door. We find ways of living with our sins, of avoiding the reality of our lives, so that when we are invited to enter into reality, to go through the narrow door, we grow resistant. It is with the shock of the crucifixion that we are iolted out of our complacency. We can only know Jesus Christ if we look upon the crucified one, but this is not the final word: for the one who is crucified will rise to new life. Our salvation will bring us to the glory of the heavenly banquet. In the cross the reality of this world is revealed, but that reality is not ultimately one of of hopeless violence but transforming love, healing us and raising us to new life.

Application

All of us find times in our lives when we need the help of others. It is no different with the life of faith, except that in every moment of that life we need the help of Jesus Christ. The narrow door of our salvation is the help that God sends to each one of us in the cross and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The life of a Christian is one that centres upon Jesus Christ and the help he sends to us.

Through sharing in the life of the Church we receive the help we need to find healing and begin our journey to the kingdom of God. On this journey we are transformed, so that we, as instruments of grace, become the means through which Christ's healing and transforming presence is given to others. This journey will not be easy, as we will need to face our own frailty and the sickness of this world. Yet we do not do this alone, but through the help of Jesus Christ and those he sends to aid us in our struggles.



St John Kemble was born at Rhydicar Farm, St. Weonard's in 1599. He was ordained priest at Douai in 1625 and sent to serve 'on the mission' in England. After 53 years of faithful service amongst his flock and

approaching 80 he was falsely implicated in the Titus Oates plot. St John Kemble was beatified in 1929 by Pope Pius XI and canonized on 25 October 1970 by Pope Paul VI. His feast day is 22 August. One of the martyr's hands is preserved at St. Francis Xavier's, Hereford. His body rests in Welsh Newton churchvard. The annual pilgrimage to Welsh Newton churchyard in honour of St John Kemble takes place today but the main devotions begin at the grave in Welsh Newton at 3 pm.

St John Kemble who was born at Rhydicar Farm, St. Weonard's in 1599. He was ordained priest at Douai in 1625 and sent to serve 'on the mission' in England. After 53 years of faithful service amongst his flock and approaching 80 he was falsely implicated in the Titus Oates plot.

Fr Kemble was staying near Welsh Newton, when he was arrested (by one of his own parishioners!) and although warned about the impending arrest he declined to leave his flock. He was taken to London for trial and although cleared of these charges he was nonetheless found guilty of the treasonous crime of being a priest. He was returned to Hereford and was hung, drawn and guartered at Widemarsh Common in 1679. Before he was led out to his execution Fr Kemble insisted on saying his prayers and finishing his drink, and the assembled party joined the elderly priest in a final smoke and a drink.

John Kemble was beatified in 1929 by Pope Pius XI and canonized on 25 October 1970 by Pope Paul VI. His feast day is 22 August. One of the martyr's hands is preserved at St. Francis Xavier's, Hereford. His body rests in Welsh Newton churchyard.
